Finham Park Multi Academy Trust (FPMAT) currently has 4 schools. These are: Finham Primary; Lyng Hall School; Finham Park and Finham Park 2. Finham Park Multi Academy Trust are proud to be Mandarin Excellence Programme. Mandarin Chinese opens up a world of opportunity. As the most spoken language in the world, it can connect speakers with an exciting and dynamic culture as well as boost career opportunities.

Mandarin has been identified as one of the most important languages for the UK's future prosperity. The Mandarin Excellence Programme is a unique yet intensive programme which will see at least 5000 pupils on track to achieving this goal by 2020.

Through the links with sister schools in Shanghai, we are able to offer students and staff a wide range of opportunities which otherwise wouldn't be possible. Students from Shanghai recently visited us at Finham Park, and there is a planned visit for students and staff to Shanghai in October 2018. It is not only the language acquisition, but supporting cultural and global experiences which will remain with them for the rest of their lives.

There are a range of opportunities that students benefit from throughout their time in FPMAT which we believe are only possible through our strong partnership.

Assessment Progression

Subjects have completed an assessment overview from Nursery – GCSE.

It was essential we ensure our expectations as a MAT (FPMAT) are consistent. Co-constructing the assessments will ensure the learning experiences for students across FPMAT are consistent, continually progressive and cohesive.

Moderation as a MAT

After creating their assessments, subjects then used their co-construction meeting to moderate work as a MAT against the new assessment criteria (using FROG).

The continuation of this work will ensure that progress is accurately and consistently tracked across FPMAT.

FPMAT FROG

This year, a FPMAT FROG site was created to ensure ease of collaboration. This particular site was accessible to ALL schools. Many of the documents were created on Google Docs and could therefore be continually edited and viewed by staff across the MAT. Staff have also used the site to communicate and share helpful resources. For 2017-2018, we will have a FPMAT Frog Connect site set up for all to access.

Improving Transition and Seamless Progression

All subjects have created or have started looking at transfer of information at transition from year 6 -7. Previously staff received English, Maths and Science assessments but very little information about the children's ability in other subjects. Science have also created a baseline assessment. They wanted to focus on skills the children should already have from primary rather than test them on secondary skills.

A number of subjects such as Geography and History, created a topic overview to ensure topics were not repeated between years and if they were, then they ensured they were covering progressive skills.

By sharing greater information, staff are able to ensure a smooth transition and seamless progression for students.

Broad and balanced curriculum


Our aim is to ensure children within the MAT receive a broad and balanced curriculum, which is also creative and inspiring. This is at a time when some schools are reducing curriculum choices, whereas we are able to broaden choices available to students.








Mandarin



SOCIOLOGY IN ACTION DAY AT WARWICK UNIVERSITY



On Monday 4th December, year 12 and 13 pupil's sociology pupils attended a conference at Warwick University called 'Sociology in Action'. The conference included guest speakers, including a talk from Dr Nathaniel Coleman from the University of Southampton about issues of race and ethnicity in a wide range of sociological areas. We also had sessions on 'the importance of education in the UK from a sociological perspective'. 'The effects of growing up and living in unequal countries' and 'risk factors in the criminal justice system'. Each one was looking into a specific area of the sociology curriculum and there was also a workshop on examination skills which was useful.

Each presenter was extremely passionate about what they were discussing and continuously asked if the audience has any queries which they would be happy to answer. This kept the audience engaged within the topic and made the pupils more curious about how the educational system was in the past.



As the trip came to an end, each pupil from year 12 and 13 all agreed that they were glad they attended to the conference due to making them understand more about certain topics within the educational module in sociology. It was also interesting to spend time in an academic institution which all students agreed was beneficial in preparing them for university.

Junior University

Lyng Hall works closely with Warwick and Coventry University, so a visit from Aston University was a chance to show students in Year 10 University life in a different city. Working with student mentors from Aston University, Year 10 pupils were split into two groups. The initial focus was a forum on university life at Aston: University life, the courses on offer, fees and the practicalities of attending a university, financial support, student loans, accommodation, and different kinds of societies that run and students could get involved with.

The two groups then worked on two different tasks. Group one, working with a Law student, developed for and against arguments for fictional court cases, to experience assignments first hand. The second group split into two, developing ideas for fictional university courses, considering entry requirements, course costs and future job prospects.





Pupils will visit Newman University, to look around, experience the environment and be able to ask more questions. They will also present their combined ideas during the session, to show what they have produced and get a different perspective from another Birmingham location.

This year's challenge asked students to focus on:

"Churchill said, 'Democracy is the worst form of government, except for others.' How would you improve the democratic system in this country?"

Iga Jasinska responded to the challenge by writing an essay exploring views on how to improve the democratic system in this country. The essay begins by revisiting the origin of the word 'democracy' from the Greek words 'demos' and 'kratos' – literall meaning 'The rule of the people' from the fourth century BC when the idea of democracy was first established in Athens, Greece. Iga's essay goes on to explore the current political climate in the UK; the role of the press; and public engagement with politics.






Gloves


Socks

Following this they are interviewed by Miss Gater and Mrs Smith.

Selected pupils then earn the opportunity to go on the Bassetlaw Summer school. The first day students visit the EDF power station in Bassetlaw. The following week they go to London and experience a range of exciting activities and events to stretch their horizons and teach them more about the world beyond education. This will include visiting: the Houses of Parliament, Clifford Chance (a Golden Circle law Firm), Pentland PLC (a PR and marketing firm), the BBC and many, many more.

Attached is an image of the pupils at the BBC from the 2017 Bassetlaw adventure. Nidhi Himatlal, Year 12 shared, "A life-changing adventure. We went to law firms, such as Clifford Chance, which was a sophisticated building, with many facilities—it was an amazing place.. "Anisa Mahmood, Year 12, "We met the Prince of Saudi Arabia, at the Saudi Arabian Embassy. We discussed the current situation in their country and enjoyed a marvellous banquet of Arabian food. It was a perfect day."


Graphic Novels

The Masterclass gave students the opportunity to learn from someone at the top of their field, as well as experiment with their own characters and designs.






Languages
